NOVEMBER 2018 NEWS

The afternoon on November 2nd, our Sewpportive team of six: Gregg, Norma, Margie, Joyce, Brian and Julie, arrived in Victoria Falls. We had a warm welcome of 104 degrees Fahrenheit. Although a bit jet lagged after our 24-hour journey to southern Africa from the USA, the group was ready for the busy 10 days ahead.

Our first visit followed the next morning at Chisuma village. Pepsi Rice organized and accompanied us to her home village. The meeting started with Pepsi introducing us, followed by a beautiful prayer. Then she shared our mission



and purpose with the village leaders and women from this community. The leaders were very pleased we were there to help and granted us approval to help their community.

The day had cooled down a couple of degrees – just a couple of degrees. We moved to a classroom where the sewing fun started. All hands were on deck, Gregg and Brian were the photographers, while Joyce and Norma helped setup and kept supplies distributed as need. Margie was part of the sewing process in the USA so she and Julie took it one sewing step at a time with our Chisuma friends. Tracing, cutting, sewing, adding snaps and Velcro – each step was covered in the few hours in this beautiful village we were now part of. The women listened attentively, participated and helped each other. They learned quickly. We reminded them that practice makes perfect. They were all excited to have their new sewing group so they could practice, become more efficient, and produce high quality feminine pads.



These lovely women sang and danced at the end of our visit and shared their gratitude and enthusiasm to be successful with this project in their community.



We were off to visit our friends at Sianyanga on Monday. Mr. Ncube and Mr. Munsaka orchestrated a beautiful program for our group. Songs were performed by students, mothers, and the young ladies from the Saturday sewing group. Beautiful poems were recited, and we were entertained with a play the women acted out sharing the process and progress of their sewing group.

The sewing group was very pleased and appreciative of the delivery of fabric and sewing supplies, and the school staff and students were thrilled with the with school items our team and friends from the USA donated.



Sianyanga's Saturday sewing group participants are learning how to use the non-electric sewing machines. The mothers are teaching the girls how to use these machines to improve their productivity. Both groups are busy working as a team to produce high quality feminine hygiene items.



The women had produced intricately woven baskets, so before saying goodbye to our Sianyanga family, we purchased as many baskets as we could carry. I'm not sure

who was more excited; them for selling their handcrafts or us for buying these beautiful artisan pieces! 🌸 🌸 🌸



Our final community visit was with our friends at White Waters High School on Saturday. We were thrilled and excited to see the number of students who came back to school on their day off to meet our group. The girls updated us on their pad production. They were doing amazing work! We delivered more needed sewing supplies and fabric. The students sang, danced, performed skits, and taught us new games. Many thanks to Isabel Ndebele for organizing the fun day at White Waters, and special thanks to Lin and Tawanda at Big Cave Lodge for keeping us connected to this community, providing transportation and their continued love and support.



All of these communities that we have met through our Sewpportive Friends mission have shared the many needs of their village families. One need is that families are unable to pay their child's school tuition which will result in the child dropping out of school. We have 35 children now whose school fees are being paid by friends of the Sewpportive Friends mission. If you are interested in helping with a child's educational fees, please drop us an email at

Then came my big question to Julie...Do you need help delivering these to Zimbabwe?

At this point, my foot was healing and getting stronger and Julie happened to be planning a trip in November. Without hesitation, I was in! Julie and I were to be "tent mates" and her cousin, Gregg Wolff, and his wife, Norma, were also going to join us.
