Simple ways to help THE LOCAL ECONOMY

While our focus is providing feminine hygiene kits and teaching local girls and women to sew, we are always interested and open to other ways we can better the communities we sponsor.

This July, we are meeting with fabric suppliers in Victoria Falls to evaluate our options about purchasing sewing class materials locally. We will strive to find high quality fabric and materials similar to what we use when the pads are sewn in the U.S. By purchasing our materials in Zimbabwe, we will be supporting the local economy and know that each dollar donated is going further, because it will be re-invested back into the community.

THE HUMAN RIGHTS SITUATION

The talk provided purpose for why our work is imperative in this region. Zimbabwe has a 60-75% poverty rate and food shortages are a constant worry in the rural areas. In addition, the lack of trained medical staff remains a significant problem. According to the World Health Organization, during 2000-2010 Zimbabwe had fewer than two doctors for every 10,000 people.

Sewpportive Friends is dedicated to health, education and gender equality for young women in rural Africa. We plan to provide the tools and hope, so they may have a successful, brighter future.

Stone Age Rock Art

With our current focus on helping communities in Zimbabwe, we thought it would be fun to share interesting facts we came across during our travels.

This landlocked country is located in the southern hemisphere; bordering South Africa, Botswana, Zambia and Mozambique. It is the size of the state of Montana. Zimbabwe is a beautiful country, rich in history, culture, art, flora and fauna that you cannot find outside of this region of the world.


During our last trip, we visited the unique area of Matobo Hills which is located just south of Zimbabwe's second largest city, Bulawayo. The landscape is made up of massive rock



formations and kopjes that cover over 1,200 square miles. Hidden in the crevices and caves of these formations is the evidence, history and story of the "San" people; the bushman paintings. Some say this area is the origin of man.

"The San artists used special pigments and natural minerals that have survived the onslaught of climate and time." This region has the highest concentration of rock art in all of Southern Africa. There are over 15,000 sights and some of these paintings are over 13,000 years old.
