The following is a note from Phiona Nabusheka, a native Zimbabwean friend from the village of Sianyanga.

"The introduction of recyclable pads by Julie and her team has helped girls and women in our community. Empowerment has knocked to every door of a woman in our community. Women have been enlightened to see that they have capabilities to sustain themselves in their lives. Sewpportive has changed the mindset of woman, where a woman thinks that she is a woman she has to depend on her husband every time.

Julie has inspired women in our community. They have realized that with the skills acquired from Sewpportive they can climb the ladder of success and transform their lives.

The parents were grateful such that they asked her to teach them how to sew the pads. During her next visit she brought materials and taught a few women how to sew the pads. The number kept on increasing as more women joined the group.

We are looking forward to teach nearby villages because we are in remote areas where there are no shops, whereas most

people are unemployed so they have no money to buy sanitary pads for their children.

There is no way to fully express our gratitude for what you have done. You have transformed the life of women and girls in our community. Girls were facing menstrual problems at school sometimes they had to absent themselves from school during periods but with Sewpportive all these problems had been solved.

Our November Visit

November 11th, we departed with 200 pounds of supplies and kits. There were only two of us flying to Zimbabwe but many friends who were there in spirit. We had many friends who generously donated so we could help more girls and women, providing a healthy option for managing their menstrual cycle so they can stay in school, go to work, and live a life without interruption.

Our journey overview....

Rise N Shine Girls Club: 8:45 a.m., our driver picked us up and drove us to Lupinyu village, and villages B27, B28, and B29. These villages are named after the borehole which is closest to their homestead. Our native Zimbabwean friend, Charlene Nolan, joined us. She introduced us to Sfe Sebata and her husband Shorai Matambanadzo, who live in a village in this area. Sfe and Shorai founded an after-school girls club, Rise N Shine, to teach the girls a vocation through art.

Before heading to meet the girls for our sewing class, we headed to the village "head leaders," Florence Mkhandlas and her husband, Mthelisi Mkandla, as well as the village "secretary." It is respectful to get approval from the leaders before helping their villages. We sat with Florence and Mthelisi,

listened and conversed. Sfe was our interpreter. We enjoyed learning more about their village life.



We then went to meet with the girl's club in Lupinyu village. There we sat and visited with another Community Leader, Gama Siwelas, who provided a space for all of us to meet. A little rain had moved in so we sat in his kitchen hut. A truly beautiful place with incredible handmade details.

The rain passed and we moved our growing group to an openair space. Our two-hour sewing class passed quickly. Success. They showed confidence in their ability to create their own padlets and pad inserts with the sewing materials we provided.

We distributed the remaining kits, fabric and sewing supplies to the club. The mothers displayed a variety of hand-crafts they had made. We purchased beautiful placemats, wooden statues of Zimbabwean wildlife, elephant straw baskets, carved serving utensils, painted table runners, and the children's artwork, which was created in Sfe and Shorai's afterschool art classes. The visit ended with the girls performing a song about Jesus and gratitude. Harmony from these young angels surrounded us. We were full of joy from the day's meetings with our new friends, and felt blessed for this opportunity, yet were sad to say goodbye.

Sianyanga Primary School: Our next visit was at Sianyanga Primary School. The students range from 4 to 12 years old. Our

Sewpportive Friends focus is on the 10-12 year old girls. The girls, mothers, grandmothers and village elders participated in a celebration of gratitude. Students of all ages sang, recited poems and shared speeches. We enjoyed an 1½ hour, beautifully organized program.

After the celebration, the girls and women joined us in a classroom to chat about their sewing progress and about life. We laughed and had a nice visit. We then moved to another classroom which was filled with hand-made baskets. We bought as many beautiful hand-crafts that we could carry. They were so excited to show us their artistry and thrilled to have an income. There were hugs and waves as we said goodbye to our friends.

White Waters High School: We woke to a cool African morning, so an extra layer was added for our drive to White Waters High School with Tawanda and Lin from Big Cave Lodge. The school is about 45 minutes from the lodge. Quickly our fleece was peeled away as the morning warmed up to a lovely 80 degrees.

We had met with the teachers and girls this past July so we wanted to focus on their sewing progress and to provide additional fabric, Velcro, scissors, cardstock, etc. Their sewing club is excited about this sewing project and so grateful for the supplies and support to their community.

We also met with Charles, the Headmaster, discussing academics, school needs, and future projects. Our visit ended with Zimbabwean handshakes, hugs and goodbyes until next time.

This trip provided kits and supplies to make life a little easier for many girls and women. After our many conversations, we could hear and clearly see the hope, joy and happiness brought into their lives from the love and compassion shared by all of you.
